


Employer and stakeholder connections


Such collaboration allows us all to amplify our voice to secure opportunities for the region as a whole and its students and apprentices specifically. Our partners fall into four categories:


Civic

We work with councils, political bodies and elected representatives at all levels - local, regional and national - to ensure our voice is heard and influences key decision-makers.

This work includes building strong relationships with, and lobbying politicians to support our campaigns on everything from further education funding to curriculum reviews. It also involves practical collaboration with local authorities, for example to secure buildings for the new or upgraded campuses our students, and region, need.



And our work with organisations like the West Yorkshire Combined Authority and the newly formed York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority is integral to our provision of courses for adults, which help people of all ages upskill, retrain and expand their horizons.



Mayor of West Yorkshire Tracy Brabin visited Leeds City College's Quarry Hill campus in February, as part of Colleges Week 2024, to share acting tips and announce her support for a campaign to change the rules so that colleges can have their VAT costs reimbursed.

She said: "At a crucial time for learning and development, college students deserve to have all the resources they need to thrive."



Keighley College's key role in tackling regional skills gaps was recognised in October 2023 when the former Minister for Skills, Apprenticeships and Higher Education, Robert Halfon, and Keighley MP Robbie Moore visited the campus for a roundtable discussion.

The event also involved representatives from manufacturing and engineering company Teconnex, whose OCS and Documents Coordinator Alisha Bell (pictured, far right) - a former Keighley College student - contributed to a discussion about how more women could be attracted to an engineering career.

Community

Helping people of all ages realise their potential, despite sometimes significant challenges in their home life or finances, is one of our key goals - and it is one that is more realistically achieved through the power of collaboration.

So we are proud to work with numerous organisations across West and North Yorkshire, including CATCH Leeds (and, through it, Leeds Learning Alliance) that work tirelessly to empower people of all ages and open up educational and other opportunities for them.



Doing so allows us to use our influence and connections to support the work of all kinds of voluntary and community groups while also giving our learners the chance to get involved and gain real-world experience of the third sector.



Leeds City College and Leeds Sixth Form College students volunteer regularly for CATCH Leeds, supporting everything from animal care - on the group's farm - to table tennis.

A few were lucky enough to meet Prince William when he presented CATCH Leeds with the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.



Harrogate College began 2024 by welcoming Andy's Man Club, a charity that specialises in supporting men's wellbeing, onto campus.

The group, which offers free peer-to-peer support sessions, was looking for a base in this part of Yorkshire - and the college was delighted to be able to help.

Pastoral/Safeguarding programme manager, Kerry Walker, said: "Many of our learners will turn 18 while they are with us so they, along with so many people in the community, are set to benefit."

Employers

The group is currently working with over 800 businesses and actively seeking, and reacting, to their feedback to ensure we are building a robust future workforce equipped with the skills employers need.

Our employer engagement strategy provides a framework for us to continually monitor, evaluate and refine our working relationships to ensure they result in us shaping our courses to meet the demands of industry - and so boost the employability of our students.





Harrogate College has forged ties with businesses across North Yorkshire through its Employers' Network, which has around 120 members including Boroughbridge-based ATM Ltd.

HR administrator, Kelly Thomas, said: "The best way to grow our workforce is by identifying someone who has an interest in our industry, investing in their development, and nurturing their progression.

"We aim to do this through apprenticeships and encouraging those leaving college to consider a career at ATM - and that's where the network comes into its own, and sets Harrogate College apart from others we work with."



Our business connections secure fantastic career opportunities for our students and apprentices - like quality engineer Alex Johnson (pictured), who has flourished, through her Keighley College apprenticeship, with specialist high-precision engineering firm Produmax.

Education

As one of the north of England's biggest education providers we work closely with schools, fellow colleges, higher education providers and regional and national organisations to ensure our combined efforts deliver the best results.

Through the collaborative projects we foster as part of the West Yorkshire Consortium of Colleges, we also make sure that we are working smartly with our partners to offer the very best training and support possible.

A report commissioned by our group highlighted the steps that could be taken to enable colleges to play a leading role in supporting West Yorkshire's flourishing finance and professional services (FPS) industry.

Building on the work of the Yorkshire and Humber Financial and Professional Services Skills Commission, the research highlighted how colleges are currently an untapped resource for a sector that employs around 80,000 people in the region.

Results days aren't the be-all and end-all of education but they are, understandably, a huge part of the student experience.




